In recent years Heritage Management has developed into a growing area of employment in the public and private sector and a significant focus for global scholarship. UQ's new suite of postgraduate programs in Heritage Management allows graduates of archaeology, anthropology, history and related disciplines aiming to develop the advanced skills and knowledge required by employers in the global heritage sector. Complementing UQ's well-regarded Museum Studies Program, Heritage Management provides a nationally unique option for graduate students focusing on the management of heritage places within prevailing statutory frameworks, including World Heritage practice.

WHY STUDY AT UQ

UQ's Heritage Management Program draws on staff expertise in heritage research and consulting, including our in-house consultancy, the UQ Culture and Heritage Unit.

The program focuses on developing real-world professional skills by providing knowledge of the legal frameworks, processes and practices utilised in the management of heritage places such as archaeological sites, landscapes, places of spiritual, and other cultural significance, and heritage buildings.

Community focused, ethical training that draws on perspectives from a number of disciplines including archaeology, anthropology and history, students will put their knowledge into practice in field and classroom settings, including 10-day residential archaeology and museum studies field schools in Australia and overseas (currently Cyprus and Vietnam).

WHAT YOU STUDY

Core courses in World Heritage, Place Management and field practice are supplemented by elective classes in a variety of courses selected by students to develop specific professional interests, including law, tourism, development, interpretation and museum practice.

Applicants to the Heritage Management suite of programs must hold a tertiary degree in a related area or have 2 years of full time equivalent work experience in relevant areas of professional heritage practice.

The Master of Heritage Management is offered as a 16 or 24 unit program (equivalent to two or three semesters of full-time study), depending on your undergraduate qualification and experience.

A Graduate Certificate is also available.
